On August 21, 2010 at approximately 7:30 a.m., §87(2)(6) was arrested at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in the Bronx by PO Angela Polancobrito of the 46th Precinct. The following allegations resulted: Allegation A – Discourtesy: PO Angela Polancobrito spoke obscenely to \$87(2)(b) at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue and at the 46th Precinct Stationhouse in the Bronx. Allegation B – Force: PO Angela Polancobrito used physical force against \$87(2)(b) at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in the Bronx. §87(2)(0) Allegation C – Force: PO Angela Polancobrito struck 8 of (2)(0) with an asp at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in the Bronx. §87(2)(0) Allegation D – Force: PO Steven Eromenok used physical force against at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in the Bronx. Allegation E – Force: PO Gypsy Pichardo used physical force against [887(2)(6)] at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in the Bronx. Attempts to Contact Civilians

Field work was conducted on January 11, 2011. The undersigned investigator spoke to the manager of § 87(2)(b) , who indicated that they only store their security footage for three days. Letters posted in the area of the incident failed to yield any witnesses. The 46th Precinct Command log indicated that there were five other arrests stemming from the incident: and Their addresses were obtained from the Command Log and letters were sent to all of them on January 24, 2011 and February 1, 2011. Both letters sent to \$87(2)(b) returned by the United States Postal Service. A Lexis-Nexis search for [S87(2)(b) additional address for him and letters were sent to the new address on February 10, 2011 and February 14, 2011. These letters were also returned by the United States Postal Service. The letters sent to § 87(2)(b) and § 87(2)(b) were not returned by the United States Postal Service. A search of the Cole's Directory failed to find any possible OΓ § 87(2)(b) phone numbers for § 87(2)(b) One phone number was found for § 87(2)(b) and calls were made to that number on February 2, 2011, February 7, 2011, February 10, 2011, February 14, 2011 and February 16, 2011. These calls revealed that the number was not in service. To date, none of these individuals have responded to these contact attempts.

NYPD Statement(s):

Subject Officer: PO ANGELA POLANCOBRITO

- She is a Hispanic female who was years old at the time of the incident. She is 5'7" tall, weighs 130 pounds and has black hair and brown eyes.
- She is assigned to the 46th Precinct. She worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. She was assigned to patrol sectors I and J with PO Rafael Colon in a marked RMP.

At 7:00 a.m., PO Polancobrito responded to a call for additional units made by Sector C/D at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue. At 7:20 a.m., PO Polancobrito had two under for disorderly conduct for engaging in fighting and violent behavior against PO Polancobrito, placing her in fear for her safety.

Ser(2)(b)

threatened to sue the NYPD and was apparently intoxicated and got an earlier summons for drinking in public with an open container.

PO Polancobrito and PO Polancobrito had to display the baton but just used the minimum amount of force.

Ser(2)(b)

refused to move and swung at PO Polancobrito and other officers at the scene on more than one occasion.

would sue her and repeated in an attempt to intimidate the officers from doing their job. She was handcuffed by other officers at the scene. At 8:42 a.m., \$87(2)(5) was given another summons for refusing orders and using obscene language in front of people inside of the precinct. [37(2)] also indicated that her father was a sergeant and said, "You can not do shit to me bitch, I am untouchable. Fuck everybody." At 9:45 a.m., \$87(2)(b) was released (encl. 7A - 7F). Summonses The summonses issued to were unable to be obtained by the IAB Liaison unit. CCRB Testimony PO Angela Polancobrito was interviewed at the CCRB on March 22, 2011 (encl. 7G – 7I). PO Polancobrito responded to a call for additional units and when she arrived there were a lot of people who were very irritated and acted as if they were drunk. The crowd acted out of control, jumping, swinging and pushing the officers and refusing to leave. PO Polancobrito displayed her baton and, grabbing it with two hands on either end, used it to push people back to prevent herself from getting hurt. PO Polancobrito did not strike anyone with her baton. One female, identified through investigation as refused to leave when an unknown officer and PO Polancobrito told her to disperse. The unknown officer had his back to

One female, identified through investigation as unknown officer and PO Polancobrito told her to disperse. The unknown officer had his back to and she jumped on his back, hanging onto the officer by his shoulders. PO Polancobrito grabbed and put her against the wall. Lieutenant Williams also ordered PO Polancobrito to arrest after she had jumped on the officer's back. Ser(2)(b) after she had jumped on the officer's back. Ser(2)(b) had a very strong odor of alcohol on her breath and was acting like an EDP. PO Polancobrito indicated that she had her baton displayed before but did not recall using it against Another officer assisted PO Polancobrito in handcuffing her.

At the stationhouse, PO Polancobrito placed her in the cells and searched her. She discovered that § 87(2)(b) had received a summons for an open container the previous night at approximately 9:00 p.m. §87(2)(b) told her that that she better let her out of the cells and that her father was \$ 87(2)(b) and if she did not release her he would get her fired. PO Polancobrito ignored her and gave her the summons and told \$87(2)(b) that she was ready to go. refused to leave and told PO Polancobrito that she would not get away with this and that she would regret it. § 87(2)(b) sat on the steps of the stationhouse and blocked the door and refused to move while yelling and cursing at the officers around her. PO Polancobrito and other unidentified officers told her a couple of times to move but §87(2)(b) refused and Lieutenant Williams ordered PO Polancobrito to place her back in the cells and issue her another summons. PO Polancobrito also called § 87(2)(b) s father to see if § 87(2)(b) was telling the truth. 87(2) told PO Polancobrito to give her a summons because his daughter was out of control and he was tired of her bad behavior. was held in the cells for about 10 minutes before she was released with a second summons for disorderly conduct. any profanity against her. She did not recall pushing \$87(2)(b) to get the "fuck" out of her way or using or hitting her with her beton was still saying things after receiving this summons but left. She did not recall § 87(2)(b) recall her asking for her name and badge number. She did not recall telling §87(2)(b) she was going to make a complaint she could get her "ass" back in the cage. She did not recall if another officer ever provided \$87(2)(b) with her name and shield number on a piece of paper.

At the end of her interview, PO Polancobrito was shown the video of the incident. When asked if the officer using the baton in the video was her, PO Polancobrito replied, "I can't even see my face... if that's me." She did not recall if that was her and did not recall if the civilian was The video did not help her recall anything more about the incident.

Subject Officer: PO STEVEN EROMENOK

- He is a white male who was years old at the time of the incident. He is 6'2" tall, weighs 275 pounds and has brown hair and brown eyes.
- He is assigned to the 46th Precinct. He worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. He was assigned to patrol sectors K and P with PO Lawrence Dunlay in a marked RMP.

Memo Book

PO Eromenok had no memo book entries regarding the incident (encl. 11A – 11D).

CCRB Testimony

PO Steven Eromenok was interviewed at the CCRB on April 20, 2011 (encl. 11E – 11F). On August 21, 2010 at approximately 7:30 a.m., PO Eromenok and PO Dunlay responded to a call for additional units and upon arriving there were already a lot of officers there. There were patches of people in the area who attempted to interfere with the arrests and refused to move away from the scene. PO Eromenok could not recall the incident that well and did not recall assisting in arresting anyone. PO Eromenok was shown the video clip of the incident but it did not refresh his memory. He could not recognize if he was one of the officers in the video.

Subject Officer: PO GYPSY PICHARDO

- He is a Hispanic male who was $\frac{1}{870}$ years old at the time of the incident. He is 6'4" tall, weighs 240 pounds and is bald and has green eyes.
- He is assigned to the 46th Precinct. He worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. He was assigned to patrol sector H with PO Hobson in a marked RMP.

Memo Book

At 7:18 a.m. he responded to a call for additional units to East 188^{th} Street and Webster Avenue. At 7:28 a.m. he arrived back at the precinct (encl. 15A - 15C).

CCRB Testimony

PO Gypsy Pichardo was interviewed at the CCRB on May 24, 2011 (encl. 15D - 15E). On August 21, 2010, PO Pichardo responded to a call for additional units for a disorderly group. Upon arriving to the scene, there was about 10 - 20 people on the street and sidewalk who were mostly intoxicated. PO Pichardo could tell they were intoxicated because they smelled of alcohol. The crowd refused to move and yelled at the officers who tried to get them to disperse.

One heavyset Hispanic female, identified through investigation as told to move and refused and cursed and yelled back at the male and female officers around her. PO Pichardo could not recall the identities of these officers.

Ser(2)(b)

pushed an officer, PO Pichardo could not recall who, and then the officers attempted to arrest her. She resisted arrest by

Page 6 CCRB Case # 201016396 refusing to put her hands behind her back and pushing the officers. PO Pichardo could not recall if an officer used an asp against her. PO Pichardo could not recall if he assisted in handcuffing but recalled that he assisted in putting her into an RMP. Tesisted being placed into the RMP by pushing back away from the car. To did the officers that she had a leg brace on and that it caused her to have a hard time walking. Before being placed into the vehicle, fell on the ground on her own and PO Pichardo had to pick her up and put her in the car. PO Pichardo could not recall if she was pushed in or placed into the vehicle. He did not see her at the precinct after the incident.

PO Pichardo never heard an officer yell, "Get the fuck out of my way" or use any profanity against her. He never saw an officer push or strike her with an asp. He never dragged her to the RMP. After seeing the video, PO Pichardo indicated that he did not think that was was the female he had helped to arrest and he did not think he was any of the officers pictured in the video. He did not recall the scene in the video happening at the incident.

Witness Officer: LIEUTENANT JOYCE WILLIAMS

- She is a black female who was years old at the time of the incident. She is 5'4" tall, weighs 140 pounds and has black hair and brown eyes.
- She is assigned to the Detective Borough Bronx. On August 21, 2010, she was assigned to the 46th Precinct. She worked, in uniform, from 11:00 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:45 a.m. on August 21, 2010. She was assigned as the platoon commander and worked alone. She was assigned to marked RMP 3247.

Memo Book

At 7:15 a.m., Lieutenant Williams arrived at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue in response to a call for additional units made by sector CD of the 46th Precinct. Upon her arrival she saw the officers struggling with the perp who refused to put his hands behind his back and continued to struggle with MOS. Lieutenant Williams maced him and he was handcuffed. The 46th PCT sector CD unit identified another person at the scene to be arrested and he ran. They chased him to where PO Hobson and PO Guzman placed him under arrest where PO Hobson and PO Guzman placed him under arrest for for yelling and screaming at the scene and failing to disperse when told to. At 7:20 a.m. they had 6 arrests and they were removed to the precinct. At 7:45 a.m., Lieutenant Williams arrived at the precinct. At 8:30 a.m., while 1 female was being released she started cursing and harassing PO Polancobrito by putting her face towards PO Polancobrito's face. She had to be told to keep her hands behind her back while being brought to the desk to be released. Lieutenant Williams told PO Polancobrito to put her back in the cell and give her another summons (encl. 8A – 8K).

CCRB Testimony

Lieutenant Joyce Williams was interviewed at the CCRB on April 4, 2011 (encl. 8L – 8N). On August 21, 2010, Lieutenant Williams recalled hearing PO Ajish Joy and PO Christopher Vega call for additional units. Lieutenant Williams was the first to arrive and assisted them in arresting a struggling perpetrator. Another perpetrator was chased into where he was arrested by PO Hobson and PO Guzman. A large crowd of 10 – 20 people formed on East 188th Street between Webster Avenue and Marion Avenue and argued with the officers, who tried to get them to disperse.

Lieutenant Williams vaguely remembered two females being arrested on the corner of East 188th Street and Webster Avenue. There were too many people on the corner so Lieutenant Williams made a general order to nearby officers to get them to disperse. She did not specifically order any officers to do so. She did not indicate that she saw any civilians jumping on any officer's back. PO Polancobrito went to the corner where she argued with a heavyset Hispanic female, who Lieutenant Williams identified as [887(2)(b)] PO Polancobrito told to move and § 87(2)(b) argued that she did not have to go. Lieutenant Williams did not recall seeing how §87(2)(b) was arrested or if an asp was used against her. Lieutenant Williams never heard PO Polancobrito say, "Get the fuck out of my way" or use any other profanity. was uncooperative after she was handcuffed and threw herself to the floor. Two officers had to pick her up and place her in the RMP. They did not drag her on the floor. Lieutenant Williams did not recall if ever complained about having a leg brace on.

While at the 46th Precinct Stationhouse, Lieutenant Williams was near the front desk when PO Polancobrito brought out storelease her with a summons. When was brought to the desk she would not listen to PO Polancobrito and they yelled back and forth at each other. Lieutenant Williams did not know what they were arguing about. When got to the desk, Lieutenant Williams told her that she was getting released with a summons and that she needed to keep her hands behind her back and be quiet. State of the officer's face. Lieutenant Williams did not recall if flailed her arms but remembered that they were not behind her back. Lieutenant Williams told PO Polancobrito that she could not release her the way she was and to put her back in the cell. Lieutenant Williams could not recall if state of paper.

To Lieutenant Williams's knowledge, \$\frac{87(2)(b)}{87(2)(b)}\$ never claimed that her father was \$\frac{87(2)(b)}{87(2)(b)}\$. She did not know if PO Polancobrito had called her father to confirm that information and thought that if either were the case PO Polancobrito would have said something to her. She did not recall hearing ask PO Polancobrito for her name and badge number. She did not hear PO Polancobrito tell \$\frac{87(2)(b)}{87(2)(b)}\$ that since she wanted to make a complaint she could get her "ass" back into the cage. \$\frac{87(2)(b)}{87(2)(b)}\$ never went outside prior to being placed back into the cells. She never sat on the front steps of the stationhouse yelling or cursing.

Lieutenant Williams was shown the video clip of the incident at the end of her interview. She recognized the female officer using the asp as PO Polancobrito. Lieutenant Williams indicated that she did not recall seeing this happen during the incident. She identified one of the male officers assisting PO Polancobrito as PO Steven Eromenok of the 46th Precinct. She could not identify any other officers. She did not recall if the unidentified black female in a white shirt was arrested.

Witness Officer: SERGEANT NICOLE MCFARLANE

- She is a black female who was years old at the time of the incident. She is 5'4" tall, weighs 145 pounds and has dark brown hair and brown eyes.
- She is assigned to the 46th Precinct. On August 21, 2010, she worked, in uniform, from 6:55 a.m. until 3:52 p.m. She was assigned as the desk officer.

Sergeant Nicole McFarlane was interviewed at the CCRB on April 6, 2011 (encl. 10C – 10D). Sergeant McFarlane recalled that when she came onto the desk \$87(2)(b) were in the holding cells. Lieutenant Williams was near the desk as well and while Sergeant McFarlane was doing entries, Lieutenant Williams told her that the two female prisoners would be released shortly. Sergeant McFarlane was busy with paperwork when suddenly Lieutenant Williams told her that \$87(2)(b) was not leaving because she had been mouthing off. Sergeant McFarlane did not see or hear § 87(2)(b) mouthing off. § 87(2)(b) released later on and Sergeant McFarlane did not recall anything being wrong when she left or her saying much. Sergeant McFarlane never spoke with § 87(2)(b) and never heard her ask for PO Polancobrito's name and shield number. Sergeant McFarlane did not think she gave §87(2)(6) piece of paper with PO Polancobrito's name and shield number on it. She never heard PO Polancobrito tell 887(2)(b) did not recall 887(2)(b) that she could get her "ass" back in the cage. Sergeant McFarlane

PO Colon had no memo book entries regarding the incident (encl. 9A - 9C).

CCRB Testimony

PO Rafael Colon was interviewed at the CCRB on April 5, 2011 (encl. 9D – 9E). When PO Colon and PO Polancobrito arrived at the scene they split up and he did not see her again until they left the scene. He did not see her arrest anyone and did not recall her issuing any summonses that day.

Witness Officer: PO LAWRENCE DUNLAY

- He is a white male who was years old at the time of the incident. He is 6'1" tall, weighs 215 pounds and has grey hair and blue eyes.
- He is assigned to the 46th Precinct. He worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. He was assigned to sectors K and P with PO Steven Eromenok in a marked RMP.

When they arrived there was a hostile crowd that was yelling and screaming at the officers. PO Dunlay saw someone get arrested but he could not recall what the person looked like or whether the person was a male or female. He did not assist in handcuffing any civilians and did not see any officer use their asp. PO Dunlay was shown the video clip but it did not refresh his memory regarding the incident.

Witness Officer: PO RONALD HOBSON

- He is a black male who was type years old at the time of the incident. He is 5'11" tall, weighs 215 pounds and has black hair and brown eyes.
- He is assigned to the 46th Precinct. He worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. He was assigned to patrol with PO Gypsy Pichardo in a marked RMP.

Memo Book

PO Hobson had no memo book entries regarding the incident (encl. 13A - 13C).

CCRB Testimony

PO Ronald Hobson was interviewed at the CCRB on May 3, 2011 (encl. 13D-13E). PO Hobson and PO Pichardo responded to a call for additional units and when they arrived, PO Hobson was instructed by Lieutenant Joyce Williams to arrest a male. He and PO Sabino Guzman chased the male and eventually handcuffed him. There was a crowd of about 50 people at the scene. Some of these people were just people walking to work and had stopped to see what was going on while others were yelling and cursing at the police. PO Hobson did not see any civilians jumping on officers. PO Hobson did not assist in any other arrests and did not see anyone else get arrested. PO Hobson was shown the video clip but it did not refresh his memory regarding the incident.

Witness Officer: PO AJISH JOY

- He is an Asian male who was years old at the time of the incident. He is 5'10" tall, weighs 190 pounds and has black hair and brown eyes.
- He is assigned to the 46th Precinct. He worked, in uniform, from 11:15 p.m. on August 20, 2010 until 7:50 a.m. on August 21, 2010. He was assigned to patrol sectors C and D with PO Christopher Vega in a marked RMP.

At 7:15 a.m. he had a pick up of an assault at 188^{th} Street and Webster Avenue. At 7:20 a.m. he had four arrests and two juvenile arrests. At 7:25 a.m. he transported two juveniles to the precinct (encl. 16A - 16E).

PO Ajish Joy was interviewed at the CCRB on May 26, 2011 (encl. 16F – 16G). A male officer identifying himself as the 46th Precinct conditions sergeant indicated that he had arrived at the scene and asked the dispatcher to find the lieutenant. The dispatcher raised the 46th Precinct lieutenant, who indicated that her location was and that they had 1 under at that location. The dispatcher reiterated the call for no further units (encl. 19A - 19B).

Other Evidence

Video of the Incident

The video was provided to the CCRB by $^{\$67(2)(6)}$ s civil attorney (encl. 6A - 6G). When the clip begins, there are approximately eight people on the corner of East 188th Street and Webster Avenue. The people are virtually quiet and are standing around watching what is occurring down the block, where at least four RMPs are parked in the middle of the street (Video Screen Shot 1).

- 0:02 An unidentifiable female shouts something unintelligible.
- 0:04 An officer, identified through investigation as PO Angela Polancobrito, yells, "Shut up? Did you tell me to shut up?" while walking towards the group of people on the corner (Video Screen Shot 2).
- 0:06 who is wearing a pink shirt, comes into view. She is facing PO Polancobrito and it becomes apparent that PO Polancobrito is directing her attention at her. Sa7(2)(b) shands are not raised. There are no other officers in the vicinity.
- 0:07 \$87(2)(b) moves backwards a couple of steps, although you can not tell if it is because PO Polancobrito pushed her or because moved back on her own. As moves back, PO Polancobrito reaches for her asp (Video Screen Shot 3). In one fluid motion, PO Polancobrito takes out her asp and strikes once in the right arm, which has raised to deflect the strike (Video Screen Shot 4). PO Polancobrito continues to go after swinging her baton two or three more times. It sounds as if at least one of these swings connects with backing up against a wall in an attempt to get away from the attack.
- 0:13 Two officers, determined through investigation to be PO Gypsy Pichardo and PO Steven Eromenok, pull away from PO Polancobrito, who is still going after (Video screen Shot 5). An unidentified black female in a white t-shirt has her arm outstretched towards them, but does not touch them and does not appear to be saying anything.
- 0:14 After series is pulled away, PO Polancobrito attacks the unidentified black female, raising her baton to strike her (Video Screen Shot 6). Although you can not see if PO Polancobrito strikes the black female, you hear someone being struck with an asp off camera. series is surrounded by several officers and is against the building, presumably being handcuffed. The rest of the video does not show what happens with or PO Polancobrito.

Summons for Incident and Disposition

Polancobrito. Then, once § 87(2)(b) was out of her reach, PO Polancobrito attacked an unidentified female with her asp. Only that amount of force necessary to overcome resistance will be used to effect an arrest. Excessive force will not be tolerated. Patrol Guide Procedure 203-11 (encl. 1B - 1C). The video clearly shows that not violent or a physical threat to PO Polancobrito. any other officers § 87(2)(g) did not attack PO Polancobrito or Allegation F – Abuse of Authority: PO Angela Polancobrito refused to provide her name and shield number to \$87(2)(b) at the 46th Precinct Stationhouse. Allegation G – Abuse of Authority: PO Angela Polancobrito threatened to arrest at the 46th Precinct Stationhouse. alleged that she asked for PO Polancobrito's name and shield number and that PO Polancobrito refused. She also alleged that PO Polancobrito took the piece of paper with her name and shield number on it and that when \$87(2)(b) objected she ordered her to leave the stationhouse or she would be arrested. PO Polancobrito denied that \$87(2)(b) ever asked for her name and badge number and indicated that she only threatened to arrest \$87(2)(b) when she was making a scene on the steps of the stationhouse. Although Lieutenant Williams and Sergeant McFarlane were in the vicinity of 87(2)(0) and PO Polancobrito, they were not around them for the totality of their interaction at the stationhouse and did not know what occurred between them before was brought to the desk. Although Lieutenant Williams confirmed that § 87(2)(b) was put back in the cells, she denied that it was ever in reference to her causing a scene in front of the stationhouse. Allegation H – Abuse of Authority: PO Angela Polancobrito issued a summons to \$87(2)(b) was issued two summonses regarding the incident. Although the summonses could not be obtained by the CCRB, and PO Polancobrito indicated that a disorderly conduct summons was issued for sar(2)(b) a sactions at East 188th Street and Webster Avenue and PO Polancobrito indicated that a disorderly and a second disorderly conduct summons was issued for her actions at the 46th Precinct Stationhouse. The video shows the circumstances surrounding the issuance of the first summons. This is not the case for the second summons, for which there is only PO Polancobrito's testimony, which is not credible, and that of Lieutenant Williams, who only saw a part of the incident that led up to § 87(2)(b) s second summons. Because of this, only the appropriateness of the first summons can be correctly determined. A person is guilty of disorderly conduct when, with intent to cause public inconvenience,

A person is guilty of disorderly conduct when, with intent to cause public inconvenience, annoyance or alarm, he engages in violent or threatening behavior, makes unreasonable noise, uses obscene language or gestures, obstructs vehicular or pedestrian traffic, congregates with other persons and refuses to move or creates a hazardous or physically offensive condition. Penal Law section 240.20 (encl. 1G). To meet the jurisdictional requirement to prosecute a defendant for disorderly conduct, there must be evidence that the defendant intended to cause public

inconvenience or alarm. Something more than a mere inconvenience of pedestrians is required to support a charge for disorderly conduct. People v. Jones, 9 N.Y.3d259 (2007) (encl. 1H – 1K). PO Polancobrito claimed that she was ordered to arrest williams because she was refusing to leave the scene and had jumped on an unknown officer's back. PO Polancobrito further claimed that upon approaching pushed PO Polancobrito and attempted to swing at her as she resisted arrest.
Lieutenant Williams denied that she ordered any officer to arrest and indicated that she only made a general order to nearby officers to get a group of people to disperse from the corner of East 188 th Street and Webster Avenue.
