PO Estrada used no profanity or offensive language at the scene and she heard no officer do so. During the incident, more than one pedestrian stopped on the sidewalk to see what was going on, but PO Estrada was not paying much attention and could not provide a better estimation. No civilians at the scene tried to interfere.

PO Estrada drove car, which was not vouchered, to the stationhouse. When asked if the vehicle was searched at the scene, PO Estrada said, "No ma'am...not by me." When asked whether she saw any other officer search the car at the scene, she said, "No, I can't recall." Sgt. Tyler Ehrlein was interviewed at the CCRB on February 18, 2014 about the incident that occurred at approximately 4:31 p m. on October 28, 2013 in the vicinity of the second second

Sgt. Ehrlein and PO Quanah Stroman responded to a radio call for an officer needing assistance in the vicinity of PO Jacqueline Estrada had made the call and was at the scene with PO Sonia Mejia. Sgt. Ehrlein described the scene where the incident occurred as probably the largest transit hub in the area, containing six or seven bus stops, transit depots and an above ground train. The crosswalk is double the size of a typical crosswalk to accommodate a larger degree of pedestrian traffic. Upon arrival, Sgt. Ehrlein observed a parked car in the crosswalk on the eastbound side of the street, blocking the length of the entire crosswalk up to the corner of the sidewalk, where the pavement scoops down, which hindered southbound pedestrians from crossing the street. Sgt. Ehrlein did not know whether the scene caused pedestrians to gather because he was concerned with his officers' situation and he could not recall whether vehicular traffic was affected by the car. The area is extremely busy and a car parked in the intersection had the potential to cause many problems. Sgt. Ehrlein explained that a pedestrian was killed by a bus as they worked their way around traffic in the area a few days prior to his CCRB interview.

PO Estrada informed Sgt. Ehrlein that the driver of the car, identified via investigation as a refused to provide identification or move his car out of the crosswalk. Sgt. Ehrlein could not recall what PO Stroman and PO Mejia were doing during this time. He could not recall whether additional officers were ever present and did not recall Sgt. Jose Guzman being present, but acknowledged that it was possible that he was. As Sgt. Ehrlein approached for the driver's side, he could see inside, although he could not recall whether the windows were tinted. The were not making any reaching movements.

window was closed. Sgt. Ehrlein ordered him to provide identification. Sgt. Ehrlein could not recall whether he ordered to open his window or not, but starred straight at him and said no. Sgt. Ehrlein then ordered him to exit his car approximately two times. After the second order, complied and exited without assistance. Sgt. Ehrlein refused and said he would not move his car, but did not say why. again ordered to produce identification. Sgt. Ehrlein told PO Estrada to place under arrest and she did so for disorderly conduct. was not arrested. Sgt. Ehrlein ordered her to exit the car. He and PO Estrada did a "quick search" of the car to make sure there was no contraband. When asked whether was in the car at the time of the search, Sgt. Ehrlein first said he did not think so and then confirmed she was not, because he would not have conducted a car search with a female inside. Aside from himself and PO Estrada, Sgt. Ehrlein did not recall any additional officers entering the car. He could not specifically recall what PO Estrada did while she was inside of it. Sgt. Ehrlein could not recall whether he or any other officer touched anything in the car.

Sgt. Ehrlein described the search as looking inside of "the immediate area" of the car, specifically in the locations where the hands of the car's occupants could go. He did not recall sitting inside of the car or anything to that effect. The front and back driver and passenger seats were checked. Sgt. Ehrlein specifically recalled searching the driver's seat of the car, but could not recall which officer searched the other seats. The car was not being seized, but was being taken to the stationhouse for safekeeping and to be parked legally. The car search was conducted to ensure that there were no weapons, drugs or anything that could hurt officers inside. When asked whether there was any indication that the officers would find a weapon inside of the car prior to searching it, Sgt. Ehrlein said no and that it was just procedure to ensure the car was "clean" so that the officer who drives it does not get hurt. He further explained that the trunk was not checked, because nothing inside of the trunk could have hurt an officer. The officers were looking for anything visible, including narcotics, bottles, and anything that could "come flying" at an officer, should the car be involved in an accident. Sgt. Ehrlein noted that they looked for anything heavy "back there," such as a bat that could hurt an officer. This is always done to ensure that the car is clear, so no one is in danger of getting hurt. PBA Rep. Anthony Borelli interjected to suggest that the officers were looking for anything of value, since they were going to leave the car and someone could break into it and steal its contents. In response, Sgt. Ehrlein confirmed that the car was transported to the stationhouse. PBA Rep. At the time of this incident, Sgt. Guzman was exiting the 115th Precinct stationhouse when he heard a radio call by PO Jacqueline Estrada, who was requesting several units to the vicinity of the call was not referred to by PO Estrada as a "10-85," but she did request several units, which made the request be considered a "10-85." Sgt. Guzman headed to the location. Upon his arrival, several unidentified officers, approximately six, who had arrived in approximately three or four marked vehicles, were already there. PO Guzman does not know PO Sonia Mejia or PO Quanah Stroman. One of the vehicles was directly behind the car that was blocking traffic and one was directly to the right of the car that was blocking traffic. Since there was no room for Sgt. Guzman to park his car at the scene, he had to park across the street and approach on foot.

Sgt. Guzman approached PO Estrada and asked if she was okay, but PO Estrada did not respond. She was speaking with her sergeant, Sgt. Tyler Ehrlein, and the driver of the vehicle that was still blocking traffic, identified via investigation as was still seated in the driver's seat, but Sgt. Guzman could not recall whether anyone else was inside the car. He did not recognize was blocked up since car was blocking the entire intersection. This incident took place in a very commercial area. There is a man train station and bus depot nearby, as well as many businesses. Pedestrian traffic was identified as "incredible." Sgt. Guzman identified this as likely one of the busiest areas within the confines of the 115th Precinct.

Sgt. Guzman could not recall the conversation that was taking place between PO Estrada, Sgt. Ehrlein and but he believed PO Estrada was explaining what was going on to Sgt. Ehrlein. Sgt. Guzman, who had been ignored, realized that the scene was under control and there was no need for him to be there. He reentered his car and left the scene after having been present for approximately two minutes. He later heard over the radio that an arrest was made in regard to this incident.

Sgt. Guzman had no interactions with sectors of sectors in the did not hear PO Estrada use any profanity at the scene. Sgt. Guzman heard no civilian ask PO Estrada for her name and he did not hear PO Estrada provide her name to any civilian there. Sectors are never moved while Sgt.
